Assistant Curate's Letter

Dear friends,

Following my Ordination as Deacon at Gloucester Cathedral on 19 June, I'm now serving our benefice as Curate. Officially my title is Assistant Curate as Mike's the Curate. You probably all think he's the Vicar—and he is! I'll explain it if you'd like me to, but won't bore you with that now!

The Ordination was an incredibly special occasion for me and it was wonderful to see so many family and friends there, friends from school, work in London and Bristol, college, and so many from my connections with our churches over the years. As Bishop Rachel led us out of the service, seeing row upon row of you there to support me was extremely touching. Thanks so much to all. (Don't forget 15 July 2017 for my priesting if my curacy goes well!)

I know some weren't able to get to the Cathedral but were at the gathering afterwards at St Stephen's. It was wonderful to see you too. Thank you for being there, and for everybody's patience in waiting for me! There were also some who wanted to be with me on the day, but were unable to. Thanks for your thoughts and prayers in your absence. Thanks must also go to all those that worked so hard to get the church and food ready for the gathering and for cleaning up afterwards. You're amazing!

Now all that excitement's over, I'm just beginning to settle in as Curate. Mike and I are beginning to spend time talking about things I need to learn. Apparently there are a further 84 competencies I need to show I've achieved during my curacy! Curacy's very much a time of training. There's still plenty for me to learn and for Mike and I (and others of course) to have theological discussions about.

As a Deacon I'm now able to do baptisms. This came as a bit of a shock as I thought I had to wait until I'm priested. I've obviously been to many over the years, but more recently I've been looking more closely, in view of me doing them.

Mike and I have recently spent some time looking at the service, and thinking and talking about it. In one of our conversations we happened to have the St Stephen's Baptism Register there, and I wondered if it stretched back to the time of my baptism—it did! Some of you may even remember it. It's made me think about both my baptism and confirmation and why I chose to take those steps at that time in my life. I remember them well as they were just a week apart, and at a significant time in my life. I'd love to have a chat about them if you'd like to.

It's also reminded me that Bishop Rachel will be coming to the benefice in September for confirmations—her first visit to us. I wonder if any of you are thinking about taking that next step in your journey of faith. It's a wonderful thing to do, and if you're thinking about it, please have a chat to Mike or me. I know Bishop Rachel's very much looking forward to coming to the benefice as we spoke about it during my interview with her while on retreat before my ordination.

Heritage Open Day - Leonard Clark Display at St Stephen's - Sat 10 Sep

Leonard Clark was a famous literary figure who grew up on Belle Vue Road in the early twentieth century before leaving the Forest to become an internationally recognised poet and educationalist. He never lost his deep affection for the Forest, Cinderford and St Stephen's Church, where he was a chorister. He had been fostered shortly after birth by Sarah George, who raised him along with her own sons. The gifted young poet became a scholarship student at Monmouth School and his literary talent was encouraged by another Forest Poet,

F.W. Harvey. He requested after his death that his ashes were brought back to the Forest and interred in St Stephens Church. 'Reading the Forest,' a University of Gloucestershire project promoting the literary heritage of the Forest, will be staging an exhibition of Leonard Clark's books, info about his life and recordings of him reading his work from 10am - 4pm on Saturday 10 September as part of the Heritage Open Day events held across the Forest. The organisers are aware that many parishioners knew Leonard Clark, may have corresponded with him or have insights into his life and would be very pleased to meet with you on the day and see any memorabilia. Benefice Pilgrimage - Saturday 27 August

The Annual Benefice Pilgrimage essentially involves visiting all 5 churches in the Benefice and walking between them. At each church there's a short reflection and time for prayer and at all but the first, there will be refreshments with lunch being served at St Stephen's. In short, it is a great time for fellowship and getting to know each other better plus a chance to enjoy God's creation and to get some exercise!

The walk is mainly off-road and provides a varied and interesting opportunity to walk between all the churches. An undulating excursion just over 9 miles in total, you may want to do it all, or one or more sections. There are about 10 stiles and a couple of steepish climbs. We shall walk quiet lanes, graded paths, tracks and typical narrower Forest paths once regularly used to link the various settled areas large and small. We pass fields, woods, water, agricultural and industrial activity past and present and houses in all their variety.

In good, clear weather there are wonderful views and we have the chance to see familiar places from an unfamiliar aspect.

As some sections can be muddy at any time and several places are uneven, it is recommended that stout walking shoes or boots be worn. The first two sections are undulating with the second two much less so. Unfortunately the terrain is not pushchair friendly.

It is advisable to consider bringing waterproof clothing and also to carry water if you are walking the whole way. We aim to keep to the schedule as closely as possible so if you wish to join for one or more of the sections please note the departure time and arrive in good time. If you are unable to walk the whole way, or indeed unable to walk any of the journey, please consider joining us at one or more of the churches to join in the fellowship times and prayer.

The walk begins at St Michael's, Soudley with prayers beginning at 9.30 am. Please be aware that there are no toilet facilities at St Michael's. Walkers will depart at 10.00 am to walk to St Ethelbert's, Littledean. There are toilet facilities available and drinks will be available. Walkers will aim to arrive at 11.30 am and depart again at 12.00 noon to walk to St Stephen's, Cinderford. Lunch will be served at St Stephen's from 1.30 pm followed by a time of prayer. Walkers will depart at 2.15 pm and walk to the penultimate church, Bilson Mission, where again drinks will be available along with toilet facilities. After a short time of prayer, walkers will depart at 3.45 pm for St John's, Cinderford. Arriving at 5.00 pm for a final time of prayer along with light refreshments.

There is a group of walkers already planning on doing the whole thing and some people planning on joining in sections or for prayers. Please do consider joining us for some or all of the walk and help to carry greetings around the Benefice. If you are concerned about mobility, please speak to Peter about which section might work best for you, or just join us at one or more of the churches for prayers and fellowship (St Stephen's is a good choice as you can have lunch!).

Fairtrade Focus

Coffee Cream Torte Taken from Traidcraft's "Bake A Difference" - available at St Stephen's

Serves approximately 10, requires overnight refrigeration before serving!

Ingredients

- 450 g / 16 oz butter
- 170 ml (6 fl oz) Fairtrade strong black coffee (instant or ground - made up)*
- 450 g (16 oz) Fairtrade dark chocolate, broken into pieces*
- 200 g (7 oz) Fairtrade cane sugar*
- 50 ml (1.75 fl oz) Irish liqueur (optional)
- 6 eggs

(All starred (*) ingredients are Traidcraft products available at the Fairtrade stall at St Stephen's; ingredients marked with a hashtag (#) are available as Fairtrade but not from church - speak to Rachel for advice on where to purchase - 719438).

Method

1. Preheat oven to 160°C / gas mark 3.
2. Grease a 20 cm springform tin and base line it with baking parchment
3. In a large pan melt the butter, coffee, liqueur (if using) and sugar over a low heat until the sugar has dissolved.
4. Add the chocolate pieces and stir until melted and the mixture is smooth and glossy. Remove from the heat.
5. Using an electric mixer whisk the eggs until they are pale yellow and have tripled in volume.
6. Stir a third of the whisked eggs into the chocolate mixture to loosen it, then fold in the rest.
7. Pour the batter into the lined tin and bake for 50-60 minutes. It is ready when the sides are starting to puff and crack but the centre is still a bit wobbly - it will set as it cools.
8. Cool in the tin, on a rack and then cover tightly and refrigerate overnight.
9. To serve, loosen the edge by running a knife around it and then unclip and remove the tin. Delicious served in slender slices with extra pouring cream and some soft fruit.

Did you know? Traidcraft's Decaffeinated Freeze Dried Coffee is made in Guatemala using the Mountain Water Decaff Process, which removes caffeine naturally. Unlike the chemical processes used in other decaff coffees, Traidcraft's actually enhances the taste of the coffee.

Traidcraft's Fairtrade Coffee range covers instant, ground and whole beans. Traidcraft have a passion for excellent coffee but also a passion for the people who grow it. They are committed to working with small-scale, marginalised coffee producers. For example, they worked with CIPAC, a coffee producer in Guatemala, to help them get Fairtrade certification and develop and improve the

quality of their products. They also arranged for their coffee to be packed locally, providing extra income for communities.

CIPAC produce

Traidcraft's instant coffee, which is made from 100% high-grown, Arabica beans, which are renowned for being high quality. The instant decaffeinated coffee is also produced in Guatemala. All of these processes add value for the local community and help increase jobs and income.

CIPAC have recently suffered from the crop being affected by 'coffee rust,' a fungus which attacks the leaf of the plant. Over 20% of the cooperatives coffee bushes were lost to the disease and another 20% badly damaged. Traidcraft are working with CIPAC to address the problem through the Supporting Social Enterprises programme, plans include replanting lost coffee plants, replacing them with stronger Arabica coffee varieties.

Traidcraft also have two ranges of ground coffee everyday and speciality. The everyday range are blended coffees, made with Arabica and Robusta beans handpicked by fair trade co-operatives in Tanzania, Costa Rica, Honduras and Nicaragua. Money from the Fairtrade premium (the extra money farmers receive on top of the fair price for the product) has been spent on training to improve the quality of their crops along with community projects such as schools and healthcare.


Mario Hernandez from Nicaragua says, "We have seen achievements. Now I have money to buy clothes for my children and to build my house. Day to day things are improving because of the better price."

Traidcraft's speciality coffee range are all single-source products, meaning the coffee beans are all from one place (rather than blended as in the everyday coffees). Coffees from Ethiopia, Malawi, Rwanda and Peru (ground decaffeinated) vary in strength but all provide a fair price for small scale farmers around the world.

Fairtrade premiums have been spent on a huge variety of things benefitting both the farmers and wider communities. Projects include schools, a library, a clinic, boreholes, roads, donations of cows and goats to farmers, bicycles for farmers to carry their coffee from the remote fields, along with training on improving farming techniques and long term sustainability.
