

Dear friends,



On Sunday 29 July, a special service to celebrate the amazing contribution that Bilson Mission has made to the community for over 100 years was held in the grounds of the Mission (more information and pictures in next month's magazine).



The service booklet contained a brief outline of the history of Bilson Mission which was taken from the Preface to the 'Butterfly Quotation Book' published in May 1930 with the object of assisting the funds for the Extension of Bilson Mission. This is an excerpt from that history:



Nearly 50 years ago, in the Trafalgar Wood, a Gospel Service was regularly held on Sunday afternoons for the benefit of the local traveller population, they used to assemble themselves together in a Gospel tent, under the loving care of Miss Clifford, a very faithful and devoted servant of Christ. Miss Clifford, who lived at Trafalgar with Lady Dorothy Brain, used to walk over to the Parish Church at Cinderford every Sunday morning for service.



It was later felt that a building more substantial, with warmth and "comfort" must be found to accommodate the Worshippers during the winter months, and Miss Clifford was able, through her untiring energy, to raise sufficient funds for the erection of a wooden building, and the services were continued for some time with much blessing.



Miss Clifford eventually became the wife of the Vicar of St Stephen's, the Rev W Houlston, and the building was presented by her to the Parish, when it ceased to be used for the travelling community.



The building was removed from Trafalgar Wood and erected on a plot of land near the Upper Bilson Inn, and was used as a Mission Room under the supervision of the Vicar of the Parish. The names of Messrs. R. Pritchett, A. Hawker, and W. Brown, Lay Readers of the Parish, are still lovingly remembered, particularly for their faithful labours in connection with the Mission Room. In April of 1899 the land was acquired for other building purposes, and it was necessary to find another site for the Mission Room, and eventually it was carefully removed by Mr. Fox to its new site on Bilson Green.



The work grew and multiplied under the Rev. Thomas Longstaffe, with Mr. George Ferris as the Lay Reader, a flourishing Sunday School, and large Sunday evening congregations. In 1904, Mr. H. L. Underhill was licensed and appointed as Missioner in charge, with the Rev. W. Hancock, the Vicar of the Parish, and for 14 years he laboured faithfully and voluntarily with a splendid band of helpers. In 1918, the present Missioner, Mr. T. Witts, was licensed and appointed as honorary Parochial Reader, and the Church has continued to make rapid progress.



Sadly, the celebration on the 29th was to be the last service at Bilson Mission. The building is now closed, not due to lack of support or the enthusiasm of the congregation but due to the demise of the building. A building which has served the community for over 125 years.



But, as the short excerpt shows, I think quite clearly, the people are the church not the building. Many names are mentioned of people who faithfully campaigned and worked to make worship possible for the community. Today that work goes on, Reader Lynne Chaundy has worked tirelessly at Bilson Mission for over 30 years along with a number of incumbents, Readers and with a faithful congregation. That congregation now meet at Hanover Court, at 3 pm on the second and fourth Sundays. This enables the residents at Hanover Court to join them and the congregation has more than doubled.

Messy Church

Open the Book

Open the Book is a project which offers Primary School children a chance to hear Bible stories in weekly collective worship (assembly). Teams of volunteers from local churches present up to 30 stories during a

school year. Stories are taken from a lively version of the Bible, with the stories re-written especially for this audience.

Each presentation takes about ten minutes for which volunteers dress up & act out the story, trying to involve the children as much as possible by giving them parts. Then follows an opportunity for quiet reflection and a short prayer in which the children join in, if they wish to.

Open the Book is now part of the Bible Society and is run in our area by a number of Churches Together teams. Within the benefice we have three teams visiting schools weekly at present; Littledean C of E Primary school, St White's Primary and Forest View. A further group comes together as invited to visit Soudley Primary. Members of the groups are from across a variety of churches around Cinderford & Littledean and a number have been involved for up to 8 years.

Ride & Stride / Heritage Open Day

Saturday 8 September will be a busy weekend for many around the Benefice and the country as nationally both Ride & Stride and Heritage Open Day events are in full swing.



Ride & Stride raises money for the Historic Churches Trust (locally we raise money for Gloucestershire Historic Churches Trust as well as our own individual local churches). This money allows GHCT to award grants for caring for the county's historic church buildings.

Participants can either ride (traditionally on a bicycle but horses are allowed), stride or even drive around churches, visiting as many as they can on one day. Our local teams are busy planning their routes, but if you would like to be involved please contact a churchwarden and they will put you in touch with someone who is riding or striding! It is definitely a wonderful way to see the beautiful churches around Gloucestershire (and sampling some delicious cakes) whilst supporting local churches!

Heritage Open Day Weekend also falls at the same time, with various places of historical importance being open with exciting activities, exhibitions and displays to learn more about the heritage of buildings and the area.

This year, St Stephen's and St Ethelbert's are joining in with both Ride & Stride and Heritage Open Days and St John's will have a team of walkers out exploring Gloucester churches on Saturday 8 September.

St Stephen's will be open on Saturday 8 September from 10 am - 4pm, celebrating the musical history of the church, including displays about the blind organist, Philip Charles Walding. There will also be opportunities to listen to local organists playing during the day along with seeing the historic carillon organ (and possibly even having a go yourself!). If you have any photographs of organists, choirs or anything related to anything musical at St Stephen's, including programmes from concerts, etc it would be wonderful to display as much memorabilia as possible on the day. St Stephen's will be part of a Heritage Walking Tour on Saturday 8, with participants able to have a walking

tour around various places of historical importance around Cinderford.

St Ethelbert's, Littledean will be open for THREE days during Heritage Open Days with bellringing displays (and for a lucky few, a chance to ring the bells!) and much more.

Saturday 8 September, the church will be open from 10 am - 5 pm, with a book sale, bric-a-brac stall, a chance to look around the beautiful church, plus cakes and refreshments all day. Jim Duffin will be 'riding' for GHCT on an exercise bike, making good use of the cool church building!

Sunday 9 and 16 September, church will be open from 12 noon - 5 pm (with a service at 10.30 am), there will be refreshments available along with tours of the historic Bell Tower and a chance to ring the bells on Sunday 16 September.

Fairtrade Focus

Allotment Cake

Try changing ingredients depending on what you have in your cupboard, or indeed, growing in your allotment! Ingredients

360ml vegetable oil 400g golden caster sugar*

2 eggs, beaten 300g carrots *or* courgettes, grated 200g rhubarb, stewed with a little sugar until just soft

140g walnuts*275g plain flour1 tsp baking soda1/2 tsp salt


1 tsp ground cinnamon* 1 tsp vanilla extract#

All starred (*) ingredients are products available at the Fairtrade stall at St Stephen's (or can be ordered); ingredients marked with a hashtag (#) are available as Fairtrade but not from church - speak to Rachel for advice on where to purchase if needed - rachel@cinderford-churches.org.uk / 01594 719438.

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 170°C / gas mark 3.
- 2. Grease and flour a 20 x 23 cm tin.
- 3. Mix together the oil and sugar until all the sugar dissolves.
- 4. Mix in the lightly beaten eggs.
- 5. Stir in the rhubarb and grated carrots (or courgettes).
- 6. Add all the remaining ingredients and beat to combine.
- 7. Turn the mixture into the greased and floured cake tin.
- 8. Bake in the oven for about 60 minutes, until the top is golden brown and a skewer comes out clean.
- 9. Allow to cool on a wire rack before serving.

Extra yummy served with cream cheese frosting or custard!

The spices are more potent than you might ordinarily find available in shops here, so they give your cooking a very authentic and delicious aroma, but go easy on the chilli powder! All the spices are Vegan friendly.

Each spice comes in a dainty glass jar, which can be reused when empty. The current range at St Stephen's consists of: Ground cinnamon, ginger, chilli, turmeric and garam masala plus whole cloves, fenugreek, fennel and cardamom. If you purchase 3 individual jars, gift boxes are available.

And if you like things very hot, there is also a gift box with various chillies and a recipe book and explanation of the

difference in heat.

Dalit is the trading arm of the Life Association, a registered charity who for 20 years have been building and managing schools and children's homes in India.



Profits from the sale of all Dalit products go to supporting work in India, with over 100,000 orphans having being educated over the years.

Dalit is committed to the highest standards of ethical and environmental responsibility.

For over 3000 years the caste system in India has meant that if you were born as one of the 250 million outcastes,

that is born outside the caste system, then your opportunities in life are extremely limited. Limits are applied in education, healthcare and even where you can worship.



This group of people were formerly known as untouchables but prefer to be called Dalits which means downtrodden or oppressed or is sometimes translated as broken or scattered.

The sale of all Dalit products makes a real difference to the lives of many Dalit children who would otherwise receive no education. The Life Association charity also strive to provide a place where children can grow up in a safe and loving environment.

Life Association currently runs various projects including schools providing education for hundreds of children; a boys home in Mumbai, where many of the children have been rescued from living on or near train lines and a school near Madurai for children with additional needs.

The stall at St Stephen's also sells candles, soapstone candle holders, shaving sets and other gifts for the home from Dalit. These products showcase a wide variety of traditional skills and provide employment for many people.

Each of the Dalit products are named after children from one of the schools or homes.

So every time you add a delicious spice to your cooking or baking, you are making a real difference to children and their families in India!


