


Reader's Letter

Dear friends,

On Thursday 1 February this year the well known and loved children's programme 'Blue Peter' celebrated its 5000th episode. You may have seen the special episode showing clips of previous Blue Peter shows. Later this year, in October the show will be celebrating 60 years of broadcasting the programme.

This applies to many things in and around our homes and our way of life. The way we communicate for instance, love it or hate it, the ever growing social media means we can constantly be in touch with friends and family. Just in the last 60 years (if you can remember that far back) life has changed out of all recognition.

As we approach Easter and cast our minds back over 2,000 years, we look at the familiar story of Jesus's betrayal, death on the cross and resurrection. 

The Septuagint is the Greek Translation of the (Hebrew) Old Testament. It was the translation read in the early Church and quoted by New Testament writers. Septuagint is '70' in Latin and is understood to refer to a group of translators assembled by King Ptolemy II to undertake the translation. The Septuagint is often referred to simply as LXX (Roman numerals for 70).

Palm Sunday, Holy Week & Easter Services

Palm Sunday Service - there is only one service in the Parish Churches around the Benefice, at 10.30 am, starting in The Triangle and then processing up to St Stephen's. If you feel unable to join the procession, the service will also start at St Stephen's at 10.30 am. Bishop Robert will lead the service.

Holy Week Communions - on Monday (26), Tuesday (27) and Wednesday (28) there will be a Holy Communion service at St John's starting at 7.30 pm. The services are a good time to reflect on the events that took place between Palm Sunday and Easter.

Maundy Thursday Meal & Holy Communion - at St Stephen's from 7.30 pm, the evening starts with a shared meal and Holy Communion and ends with the stripping of the Communion Table (others will then proceed to strip the altar at St John's).

Good Friday - there are various services around the Benefice; at 10.00 am, a Joint Service at Littledean URC; at 12.00 noon the various churches from around Cinderford and Littledean meet in The Triangle for the March of Witness; at 2.00 pm, a quiet reflective service around the Last Hour at the Cross at St John's and at 7.30 pm (also at St John's) a service using the Good Friday liturgy.

Holy Saturday - on Saturday 31 March, St Stephen's will be open for personal prayer from 11.00 am until 3.00 pm, with an Easter Vigil at 12 noon.

Easter Sunday - various services to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Saviour, starting with a sunrise service on Littledean Hill Road at 6.30 am (opposite the junction with Dockham Road). 9.30 am Eucharist at St John's; 9.30 am Communion at St Ethelbert's and 11.00 am All Age Communion at St Stephen's.

Fairtrade Focus

Sufia's Pastry Parcels

Recipe supplied by Traidcraft Exchange based on Sufia's recipe Ingredients

One packet of puff pastry (you can make your own if you are feeling very fancy) 250g cream cheese 60g icing sugar#

3/4 teaspoon of cinnamon*

All starred (*) ingredients are products available at the Fairtrade stall at St Stephen's (or can be ordered); ingredients marked with a hashtag (#) are available as Fairtrade but not from church - speak to Rachel for advice on where to purchase if needed - rachel@cinderford-churches.org.uk / 01594 719438.

Method

- Tip the cream cheese, cinnamon and icing sugar into a bowl and mix together – this will be the filling and topping
- 2. Cut out circles from the pastry using a cutter or an upturned glass
- 3. Place a dollop of cream cheese filling in the centre of the circle, and then seal the pastry along the edges
- 4. Bake in the oven for 12 minutes at 190 degrees, then leave to cool
- 5. Ice with the remaining cream cheese and cinnamon mixture then dust with icing sugar.

Sufia and her husband live in an area of Bangladesh largely reliant on agriculture, but they own very little land. This means that their opportunities to earn a decent living are severely limited.

For years, Sufia tried to make ends meet by labouring in jute extraction – extracting and cleaning the fibres from 'retted' jute (jute which has rotted under water to make it easier to work). These fibres are then sold and woven into baskets or bags.

The jute season is just three months long, and Sufia wasn't even paid a wage – instead receiving one bundle of jute sticks per basket of fibre extracted.

So Sufia got to thinking about new ways to earn money. Having noticed the busy junction near her house, she knew there was profit to be made by selling home made snacks and hot drinks to hungry passers-by. What she didn't know was how to access the capital she needed to get started.

Traidcraft Exchange has worked with people involved with jute for many years, helping women exactly like Sufia, at the very bottom of the supply chain.

Thanks to many years of working in the jute sector, Traidcraft Exchange staff knew that women like Sufia, despite their hard work and determination, couldn't make a living from jute alone – they need alternative incomes. That's why they set up the JEWEL project, working with hidden entrepreneurs to give them the skills and opportunities they need to leave poverty behind for good. Traidcraft Exchange helped Sufia to take part in business

Traidcraft Exchange helped Sufia to take part in business training, and join a local savings groups, who lent her a



small sum of money. Following this, she felt confident enough to invest in the first batch of ingredients, baking traditional Bangladeshi fried cakes, soaked in sugar syrup.

Now her roadside stall is thriving, and her sweet snacks are selling, quite literally, like hot cakes!

Traidcraft Exchange is the charity arm of Traidcraft, working separately, but alongside the trading company. All money raised at the Big Brew will be sent to Traidcraft Exchange and until the end of April, all money sent will be doubled through the UKAid scheme!

Rice Challenge

The rice has arrived and we are all set for our 90kg Rice Challenge! Can you join in and buy a bag or two of rice to help send a child to



secondary school for a year in Malawi?

This Fairtrade Fortnight, St Stephen's are partnering with Just Trading Scotland to sell ninety, 1kg bags of rice. The rice is Kilombero long grain rice, grown in Malawi. And the reason behind the challenge is that in Malawi a farmer has to sell 90kg of rice to send a child to secondary school for a year.

Malawi is one of the poorest countries in Africa, dependent on agriculture but beset by economic, social and environmental issues. Primary education is free, however, secondary school is not, which means that less than 1 in 3 children attend high school in Malawi.

The Kaporo Smallholder Farmers' Association (KASFA) are also able to offer 50 orphan bursaries, 5 students receiving this have gone on to college or university which is very rare for young people in this area of Malawi. These bursaries are only possible through the sale of Kilombero rice and community groups coming together to support a rice challenge.

Each 1kg bag will cost £3. Brown and white rice are both available at the same price.


