from the Benefice of Cinderford with Littledean

Spring is my favourite time of the year because of the new life and new hope which it brings, yet this year it seems that pleasant spring weather is very shy at making an appearance. As I write the temperature is low and I can only just see one end of the garden from the other because of the low cloud -November comes to mind rather than spring. God's plant creation however seems to know that spring has arrived with the new fat buds on the shrubs, the first signs of new leaf on the trees not to mention the daffodils, tulips and other spring flowers making a show; so not all gloom and doom.



Another reason for liking Spring is because when I was gainfully employed, May was always a good month because of the two bank holidays giving two shorter working weeks: whoo hoo. I don't think it's going to be quite the same having retired from paid employment. But spring is still #1 in my top four favourite seasons!

In the church year, we have passed the great festival of Easter and now approaching Ascension and then Pentecost which is from 10 to 20 of May. During those eleven days, Christians from around the world are being invited by the Archbishop of Canterbury (Justin Welby) to focus on prayer using art and scripture in connection with the theme of Changed Lives - Changing Lives. This is part of the initiative started a couple of years ago by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York called Thy Kingdom Come which encourages people to explore, through prayer, how to courageously witness to God's life-changing work.

As part of this prayer focus there will be a benefice prayer day on Saturday 12 May, when St Stephen's Church will be open between 7 am and 7 pm specifically for prayer with prayer stations set up to help with prayer ideas. More information about this day is also in this magazine.

Prayer is an essential part of Christian life, God wants his people - you and me - to talk to him and with him. Prayer does not have to use any special types of words or be complicated or wordy we can simply talk to God just as you would to a good friend or family member. Most of us will know the prayer that Jesus taught his disciples when they asked him how to pray, we know it as the Lord's Prayer. It is straight forward and to the point and is used daily all around the world.

We can pray in large or small groups or on your own; in all sorts of situations from a still and quiet location to the busyness of a shopping mall. We can pray silently or out loud, but wherever or however I would encourage us all to pray more. I know it's not the easiest of things to do in groups, large or small, I don't always find it easy to pray out loud in a group situation but God loves to hear us.

Prayer groups seem to be the least popular activity within the church life, unlike eating cake, which for some reason is very popular. Perhaps the bakers within the church should bake a prayer cake where every slice contains a prayer request or with every slice you pray for a person or certain situation. Or maybe not; this could become a bit messy with hands together-n-eyes closed!

I'm not promising any cake on the 12 May at St Stephen's but really would encourage you to come along to the church sometime during the twelve hours and pray for five of your family and friends that they would come to know Jesus and to follow him as part of the Thy Kingdom Come initiative. Or you may just want to use the quiet of the church to pray for other situations.

As I talked about at the beginning of this letter, the pleasant spring weather seems shy in showing its self but despite that, new life is there bursting through. In a similar way don't be shy about prayer life, let it flourish and be like those new buds and blossom into a new relationship with God.

MND & Ride London

I'm a mountain biker at heart; I love casual rides and a tea and cake stop of a weekend. But challenged by the efforts of my road bike riding buddies Paul and Kev, and affected by my mother's cousin's story and blog, I'd like to do something to help raise money for the Motor Neurone Disease Association and their work.



My Aunt Nikki was first diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease in December 2011. She died in September 2013. A third of people die within a year of diagnosis and over half within two years; there is no known cure and about 6 people a day die from the disease so inspired to do something, I'll be riding my first organised road sportive event in Wales on the 9 July at a mere 140kms (87 miles) with a 3 mile climb up the Tumble, just alongside Abergavenny. Three weeks later, I've also committed to training and riding for the Prudential Ride London 100 mile ride, following much of the route of the 2012 Olympic course including the iconic Box Hill climb.

If only it was as simple as jumping on the bike and going; it will take plenty of training between now and then to get used to long hours in the saddle without cake stops and without the comfort of low gears for the hill climbs! Anything you can donate as an incentive will be much appreciated and used for this important and life-changing cause.

I will have a sponsorship form with me in church, but if you're able to support me via my fundraising page at www.justgiving.com/fundraising/andycolecycling2018 that would be fantastic! There is even a rumour that if I manage to raise £1000, there will be a leg-waxing event for the full road cyclist look.... Christian Aid Corner

Christian Aid Week 2018 will be May 13 to May 19 and this year's theme, "Together we are stronger than the storms," encourages us to look further at the ways that Christian Aid are helping families in some of the poorest parts of the world to weather future storms. The campaign is specifically focussing on the stories of several individuals and families in Haiti who Victoria Jean-Louis



told us about during her visit to St Stephen's. One of the stories that Victoria . head of Christian Aid's

work in Haiti, shared with us, was that of Vilia. Vilia lived in Port-au-Prince when the earthquake hit Haiti in January 2010. She heard people running and shouting, saw wires fall and houses crumble. In the confusion and terror, she couldn't even recognise her home or neighbourhood.

As Vilia searched for her home and for her mother, she had to step over bodies lying on the ground. She never found her mother and sadly still doesn't know how she died. Bereaved and homeless, Vilia went back to her home town, 200km from Port-au-Prince, with her husband and seven children. But life was a struggle and she had nowhere safe to stay.



Christian Aid's partner KORAL saw how dire Vilia's situation was. and reached out to help her. They built her a new home, safe and strong enough to stand up to natural disasters. Vilia will never forget her mother, but help has allowed her to move on from the other things she lost. The new

house made Vilia incredibly happy, but it's done more than that. It's been a safe haven for dozens of people when they needed it most.

On the terrifying night in October 2016 when Hurricane Matthew hit, Vilia's neighbours quickly realised that her house was the only one in the area sturdy enough to cope with the hurricane. One by one, they fled to her house and she welcomed them in.

In all, 54 people sheltered safely from the hurricane in Vilia's house. Despite the ferocity of the hurricane, which left more than 800 people dead and thousands more displaced, her house lost only one roof panel. Many other homes in the area were totally destroyed.



Vilia is incredibly grateful for the help she's received, and she has used it to help others. But she knows that there remains many others in her neighbourhood who are still



struggling. She wishes she could help them too.

Could you join in this Christian Aid Week to help more people like Vilia? Each year, Christian Aid Week brings tens of thousands of people together to achieve incredible things. Please consider donating so

Christian Aid can do more and make sure that none of Vilia's neighbours have to fear the next hurricane.

Cinderford Churches Fairtrade Focus

Plastic reduction and palm oil are two major topics that have been surfacing both in the environmental world and also national news

recently, often it leaves you wondering what we can actually do to make a difference. Traidcraft are working on some sustainable solutions.

Many of you may have heard a little about the connection between Palm Oil and the destruction of rainforests and the wildlife that live there; you may have seen pictures of the devastating land loss in Indonesia and it's effect on the local communities.

Palm Oil is one of the world's most traded commodities. shockingly it's in MORE THAN HALF of the packaged products we buy from the shops. Products such as toothpaste, sweets, biscuits, sauces, cosmetics, shampoos, cleaning products, handwash and many more! Sometimes palm oil is simply listed



as "vegetable oil" on a list of ingredients so it's hard to know which products even contain it! But Palm Oil isn't produced sustainably. It's often grown on huge plantations with whole ecosystems being destroyed to produce it. In the early 1900's, palm oil was one of West Africa's biggest exports, a major source of income for farmers. But, soon, demand far outstripped supply so huge plantations were

developed across the Far East to produce cheaper palm oil. These are largely based in Indonesia and Malaysia, with 85% of all palm oil produced globally coming from these two countries.

Keeping up with demand for palm oil means MAJOR deforestation, habitat loss, climate change alongside animal cruelty and loss of rights for indigenous people. According to the World Wildlife Fund, an area the equivalent size of 300 football fields of rainforest is cleared each HOUR to make way for palm oil production. This large-scale deforestation is pushing many species to extinction, and findings show that if nothing changes, orangutans could be extinct within the next 5-10 year and Sumatran tigers in less than 3 years (and those are just two of the MANY species that face the same fate).

So what has this got to do with Fairtrade and Traidcraft? Traidcraft have always been keen to focus on smallholders, to

grow things in an environmentally friendly and sustainable way and to do things a bit differently. Traidcraft are working to reverse the trend of unsustainable palm oil production by sourcing their palm oil from smallscale farmers in Ghana. In and around the town of Asoum the palm oil grows naturally, so the farmers are working with nature rather than destroying it.

Not only is the environment being protected and wildlife not being slaughtered but the farmers are paid FAIR prices. Serendipalm also has much better facilities and working

conditions than traditional mills, and works with farmers to help them improve

their crop, providing farming advice as well as interest free loans for high yield seedlings.

The mill is the largest employer in Asoum. Over 260 employees work there in the peak harvest season, mostly local women. Workers are paid 25% above normal local levels and receive healthcare and a hot meal each day, plus the fair trade premium provides extra community benefits like clean water and healthcare for the whole community. Already facilities to obtain clean water locally, a police station, toilet blocks and a maternity facility (including local midwives) have been built.

Traidcraft's palm oil (FairPalm) was first included in their Clean & Fair cleaning products. This includes handwash (used in the toilets at St Stephen's church), washing up liquid (used in the church kitchen), laundry liquid, surface spray and bar soap. The FairPalm is also used in Traidcraft's biscuit ranges.

In conclusion: Yes, palm oil is controversial. Yes, orangutans and tigers and all manner of other species are being horrendously affected by human interference. Yes, we need to take responsibility and start thinking about where the ingredients in our products come from and avoiding unsustainable palm oil if possible. Yes, Clean & Fair products from Traidcraft can be a BIG part of that answer!

To take things one step further in making steps towards being as environmentally friendly as possible, refills are available of the Clean & Fair washing up liquid, laundry liquid and hand wash. In fact, all the laundry liquid available on the stall is refilled bottles, but you can also bring your own in to fill up if you would like.

Every refill means one less plastic bottle, which is a great step towards reducing our plastic consumption. You can either bring your own bottle / hand wash dispenser to refill or buy one of the bottles off the stall labelled as a refill. If you bring your own, you only pay for what you have, so you can bring as large or a small a container as you want!
