Vicar's Letter

Dear friends.

Sian and I had a couple of weeks in Scotland at the end of August / beginning of September. We went to a Harley rally in Aviemore for a few days (which included a trip out to Braemar, near Balmoral, where we had a brief encounter with the Queen driving a Land Rover). After Aviemore, we headed up to Inverness, then across to Applecross on the West Coast. We then headed North following the coast and


the West Coast. We then headed North following the coast and having a couple of nights in Ullapool. After a night in Durness, where the West Coast becomes the North Coast, we headed East towards John o' Groats, but stopped at Gills and took the ferry to Orkney where we stayed in Kirkwall for a week, before heading back home down the East Coast to Inverness, then Perth, then home.

We had an absolutely wonderful trip, enjoying magnificent scenery, dramatic mountains, a stunning coastline, beautiful lochs and rivers and a fascinating range of wildlife. I had been to Orkney for a day, on the ferry from John o' Groats, about 35 years ago, but hadn't seen too much. We spent most days out and about exploring, enjoying the scenery and the rich range of historic sites, from Neolithic to wartime. Reading through a guidebook I came across some information about visiting the Old Man of Hoy. The Old Man of Hoy is a 450 foot high sea stack just off the coast of Hoy, an island to the South of Orkney mainland. I was keen to go, but the guidebook said it was it was a three hour round trip on foot to and from the nearest car park, and that some of the walk was steep. Sian decided shopping in Kirkwall was a more attractive option, so I went on my own, getting up early to catch the early ferry on a wet and windy morning. The walk was enjoyable, but unspectacular until the stack came into sight at about the halfway point. The view was limited until the nearby cliff top was reached and the whole stack was visible. It was very windy and, although other walkers up there were very relaxed, enjoying the views and taking photos of the wild birds, I was somewhat freaked out. Not a lover of the top of cliffs at the best of times, the wind was causing me some considerable concern, I took a photo of the Old Man (see below), one of

the cliffs in each direction, then headed back to the trike, caught a mid-afternoon ferry back and got to hear about Sian's day.

We both had a good day, mine was one I'm sure I will remember. I had known of the Old Man of Hoy for many years, possibly going back to the televised climb in 1966, and loved seeing it. But it was also, a bit sad. For a geological structure, the Old Man of Hoy is very recent. It is not shown on maps up to 1750, but is shown as a separate structure in the early 1800s. A photo from around that time shows the stack as wider with an arch at the bottom. Some time after that a storm washed away one side of the arch leaving the stack much as it is today. Towards the end of the 1900s, a 130 feet crack had appeared in the top of the South face leaving an overhanging section which will, sooner or later, collapse. The whole

stack will, sooner or later, collapse. Possibly quite soon. That seems sad to me.



Clearly the Old Man of Hoy didn't choose to be a sea stack, it just happened. But it made me think about how we often choose to isolate ourselves when we are struggling rather than connecting more closely with those around us. Generally we do not do too well on our own and we cope better with all that life throws at us if we are part of a group. I believe that Church is such a group and that we do well to keep close to one another and make sure none of us are left isolated and prone to collapse.

Ride & Stride

Saturday 9th September; a date long circled on the calendar for Chris and I to join Gloucestershire Historic Churches Ride and Stride day, hopefully in drier conditions than last year. The evening before; the forecast looked a little damp and Chris' bike developed two broken spokes! Undaunted, I set out just before 10am from St Stephen's, heading towards Cheltenham determined to visit as many churches on the way as possible before watching the Tour Of Britain at the finish line.

Sweeping past a few churches, the plan was to head for Newent to meet up with another cycling buddy, Paul. This meant I could tick a few off early on: St Stephen's Cinderford (1), Cinderford Methodist (2), Holy Trinity (3), the URC (4) and Methodist (5) in Drybrook were straightforward. A climb up from Drybrook Cross past the rugby club and over the Stenders to Mitcheldean St Michael's and All Saints gave me 6 churches in the first few miles. A nice run out towards Aston Ingham before the lung busting climb up to St Peter's Cliffords Mesne (7) woke the legs up properly, then an easy run in to Newent to push through the Onion Fayre crowds to meet Paul at St Mary's (8).

From Newent, we headed out towards Upleadon, where St Mary the Virgin (9) had attracted a good crowd of cyclists and walkers admiring it's unusual construction, Norman door and free drinks and biscuits. On towards Hartpury Methodist (10), then down to Maisemore, St Giles (11) with Gloucester looming in sight. A rain shower saw us donning our waterproofs for the first (and definitely not last!) time for the run in to Gloucester. Over Westgate Bridge and up towards the centre of town with a slight detour to pop into St Mary de Lode (12), then back past St Nicholas (13) and up to the Cathedral (14) for a welcome and Twitter mention! Weather better, waterproofs off in preparation for the stretch into Cheltenham.

Picking up one of the National Cycle Routes to avoid the dual carriageway took us away

from a few of the possible churches in Gloucester, but we did manage to visit the Gloucester Destiny Temple (15) and then Kendall Road Baptist Church (16) which appeared to have


really pushed the boat out for riders and striders with a free BBQ, cakes and plenty of drinks. It turned out they were celebrating opening their new building with an open weekend so a little outside the usual places we visited, but as Paul wisely said 'Historic starts somewhere'!

With time getting on, we took the winding cycle route around Staverton, crossing under and over the dual carriageway, passing GCHQ and heading towards town. Our final church within a stone's throw of the Tour finish line and the waiting Kate was appropriately St Andrew's URC (17).

Thankfully the weather had been kind for the bulk of the ride, but a torrential downpour during our stand by the finish line pretty much cut short any plans to loop around Cheltenham and drove us back into the car for the lift home and a change into dry clothes. 38 miles over 4 hours with 1,800 feet of climbing meant an enjoyable day out with some fascinating buildings. A huge thanks to all those who sponsored us; we were already around the £100 mark before the day with more coming in so it's not too late if you would like to donate post-event. Also thanks to Kate for being our support

driver, fighting her way into Cheltenham and bringing us home.
Discussions are already taking place regarding next year and include making sure we have a spare bike just in case it's needed....!

Fairtrade Focus

Apple Flapjacks

Ingredients

150 g ish (6oz) apples

250 g (9oz) butter

1 tbsp honey* or golden syrup#

1 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 tsp baking paper

250 g (9oz) porridge oats

200 g (7oz) plain flour

100 g (3.5 oz) light brown sugar*

50 g (2 oz) dried fruit*

The editor has tried the recipe with mixed dried fruit, but you could use raisins or sultanas to coordinate nicely with the apple!

All starred (*) ingredients are Traidcraft products available at the Fairtrade stall at St Stephen's (or can be ordered); ingredients marked with a hashtag (#) are available as Fairtrade but not from church - speak to Rachel for advice on where to purchase if needed rachel@cinderford-churches.org.uk/01594719438.

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C / 350°F / Gas Mark 4.
- 2. Grease a deep baking tin measuring 16 x 25 cm (6 x 10 inch) with butter and flour.
- 3. Peel and chop the apples, stew gently until soft.
- 4. Place the butter and honey or syrup in a small pan, and melt together slowly until runny.
- 5. Sprinkle the bicarbonate of soda over the mixture and stir until it is frothy.
- 6. Place all the remaining ingredients in a large bowl and make a well in the centre.
- 7. Pour the melted butter mixture into the centre and mix well.
- 8. Spread half of the mixture into the prepared tin.
- 9. Spread the stewed apples over the top and then cover with the remaining mixture.
- 10. Place in the oven and bake for 25 minutes..
- 11. Allow the flapjacks to cool before cutting them into

You can use more apples and put a thicker layer, but then your pudding will have to be eaten with a spoon!

They are a real global mix of flavours - containing cashews from India, dates from Tunisia and raisins from South Africa and Chile and Cocoa from Ghanal Last week, the GEOsticks arrived. They are a gluten free, vegan savoury snack and are already changing the lives of farmers and artisans around the world!

> They are multigrain, a good source of fibre and low in sugar and with only 91 calories a bag, they are a delicious addition to lunch

or for a snack whilst out and about. The GEOsticks are available in three flavours - Sweet Chilli. Herby and Peppery. Chris and Rachel tried all three at the last Traidcraft Roadshow; Chris preferred Chilli whilst Rachel favoured the Herby ones. At 90p a pack, why not try them and see which ones you prefer?

The Fairtrade ingredients include rice from Thailand and guinoa from Peru. The guinoa is sourced from the Cabana co-operative, just north of Lake Titicaca, where there are over 500 farmers who specialise in growing and harvesting quinoa in the harsh environmental conditions there.
